Reflection of Kim Henning

"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

Philippians 4:4-7

RESURRECTION

What would you say to a five year-old? Alyssa sat by my side Thursday evening as we looked at a picture of Fay's Grandfather. Grandpa Rautmann was beloved. He enjoyed playing sheepshead. He was kind, he was gentle. He laughed easily. He chose to live a simpler life than many choose to live. He loved God and the church. And Grandpa was just a relaxing, easy to be with person. I miss him.

"Where is he?" Alyssa asked as we looked at his picture. "Grandpa Rautmann has died. He is no longer with us," I responded. "What do you mean?" she asked. "Well, everyone will one day die. No one lives forever. You are growing older. I am growing older. And one day we will die. One day, we will die and we won't be here anymore."

"What happens then?" she asked. "Well, I don't know exactly," I said. "What I do know is that when we die, we go to be with God and Jesus. We know God will take care of us after we die. We'll be ok because of Jesus. And we believe we will live together again after we die."

Alyssa seemed satisfied with that. She changed the subject and then her brief attention span shifted to something else. How would you have responded to Alyssa?

The Christian faith has a unique and powerful message to speak: 'This Jesus who was crucified has been resurrected!' The world knows about death. Every day we are reminded about death's reality. Some deaths seem tragic. Some deaths are totally unexpected. And some deaths seem like a gift. But know this: death is 100% certain. But Christians have a contrary word to speak: Be not afraid. Jesus is resurrected!

I am always a bit suspicious when someone says they don't need church. Every Sunday of the year, the community of believers comes together to remember that death does not have the last word in our lives. The early church said it poignantly: "this man.....you crucified and killed. But God raised him up." (Acts 2:23-24)

Jesus' resurrection is not a metaphor. Jesus' resurrection is a real event that has serious and joyful implications for believers. Death is not the end of the road. Death is not a terminal. "If the dead are not raised, then the dead are not raised. If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins" (I Corinthians 15). You and I believe in a resurrected Jesus Christ.

I need to share one last thought. Jesus' resurrection is real. But that is not all. The Apostle Paul also taught the church that Jesus' resurrection is power. Jesus' resurrection is more powerful than our sins. Jesus' resurrection is more powerful than Covid-19. Jesus' resurrection is more powerful than the pain of death. Jesus' resurrection is capable of raising up the down-trodden, of giving hope to those who despair, and of infusing joy into those who know only of life's drudgery and uncertainty.

"Therefore, my beloved, be steadfast, immovable, always excelling in the work of the Lord, because you know that in the Lord your labor is not in vain."



LEADING THROUGH A RAPIDLY CHANGING ENVIRONMENT WHILE RESPONDING TO THE CORONAVIRUS PANDEMIC

As you may know, the <u>National Offices</u> are now functioning from a work-from-home environment. The building is closed for now, and will remain so until the Governor of Ohio dismisses the stay-at-home order.

We have been preparing for such a move, anticipating that this was a possible, if not inevitable, scenario. While there will surely be some glitches in our normal operating procedures, we want to state with full confidence that the work of the National Setting will continue. With our

laptops, in-home wifi or personal hotspots, and most of the files and information stored in the cloud with password access, we feel that what we need is accessible to us.

We know that many of you reading this are working under similar conditions, and that many churches have converted their services to online spaces. We are all making timely and well-advised decisions about how to do the work we were called to do and protect the health of our families, faith communities, colleagues, and ourselves.

If you are looking for resources to assist your church in this challenging time, the staff at the National Setting has <u>created a page</u> to help. Along with the advice and communications being shared by your conference, the resources gathered at this page are proving to be invaluable for our churches as they struggle with what to do and how to do it.

We are maintaining our schedule of special mission offerings, including <u>One Great Hour of Sharing</u>. The offering was scheduled to be taken on March 22, 2020. Given the rapidly changing environment, perhaps the One Great Hour of Sharing offering was not taken on the suggested date. Please know it is not too late. You can participate in the offering at any time.

Our concerns regarding the security of mail delivery has forced us to make the decision to have our mail held for the time being. That way it will not be returned as undeliverable or left sitting somewhere in an empty building where it has a danger of being lost or stolen. Any checks sent to the United Church of Christ National Offices will be held by our branch of the United States Postal Service until we can physically enter the offices again.

We also understand that many churches are unable to meet at this time and that this may mean fewer funds are collected. We know that is a possibility, but we also know that people who can will continue to be generous, especially when the call is to reach out to the vulnerable that subsist in the margins with few resources.

We ask for your prayers, as we daily hold you in our prayers. We will continue every day to give our best effort on your behalf. We thank you for your patience, understanding, and ongoing support for the work of the National Setting.

- The <u>first time</u> you will need to click on "Sign Up" to create an account" with Tithe.ly. Enter your 1) Name; 2) e-mail address; 3) Input a password; 4) Input a <u>four-digit</u> Pin Number. (When you use Tithe.ly a second time all you need to enter is your e-mail and Pin Number)
- Hit Submit now you can start to give. You will be asked for your Pin number again.
- Follow the directions you will need to enter a credit or debit card number. This will be kept on the Tithe.ly system.
- Input the amount of your donation and where it says "Please Choose" hit the drop down arrow and there are several options Pledge, CAMP, Solar or Lenten are the ones in there now. We will add or change these options from time to time.
 - You have a choice to add the service fee to your donation. If you do not check the box, the church will
 pay for the service fee.
 - You can check the box for "Recurring Gift" <u>however</u> due to the cost of on-line fees, the church would prefer that you use traditional electronic giving for recurring gifts.

GRACE CONGREGATIONAL UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST IS 5 FOR 5

Our church has a history of being committed to mission beyond the walls of 2801 Garfield Street. Long before Fay and I came into your midst we heard a story that we found nearly unbelievable.

Around 1980, Grace Congregational Church's pipe organ needed a complete renovation, a project that would cost about \$60,000. The members of this community participated in a well-organized fund-raising campaign. The organ was refurbished. And when the bills were paid, about \$5,000 remained. Now what? Should the church's transfer the money into our general fund because most everyone knows that when it comes to churches, money is often tight.

Grace Congregational Church made a bold decision. After welcoming some missionaries into our midst, this church's leaders learned of a need for pianos at Silliman University in Dumaguete, Philippines. It was an easy decision. The surplus money from our organ campaign was sent to the Philippines. Somewhere in the history files of our church (downstairs!!) is a photo of those pianos that was send from the leaders at Silliman University.

From the beginning, our church has been committed to being a 5 for 5 congregation. In addition to Our Church's Wider Mission (Basic Support for the U.C.C.), the members of this church contribute to four special offerings: One Great Hour of Sharing, Neighbors in Need, Strengthen the Church, and The Christmas Fund. From the weekly offerings you give, \$42,000 is given to Our Church's Wider Mission. In 2018, members of Grace Congregational Church gave \$13,039 to the four all-church offerings.

ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING

Enclosed in this newsletter is an offering envelope to One Great Hour of Sharing, one of four all-church offerings of the United Church of Christ. Gifts given to One Great Hour of Sharing support health and human service projects in the United States and beyond. Most pertinent, gifts to One Great Hour of Sharing support the work of Disaster Ministry. That should sound familiar to you because ten volunteers from Grace Congregational Church returned from a Disaster Ministry Project in North Carolina.
